# **Our Summer Projects!**

We have four summer projects that we are currently fundraising for:

- 1. LED light bulbs are needed to replace our current incandescent bulbs. LED bulbs consume 80% less energy and do not emit the harmful UV rays that incandescent bulbs do. UV rays can be harmful to museum artifacts!
- 2. We need educational technology items to enhance our classroom and facilitate a better learning experience.
- 3. We need an automated external defibrillator and an additional two fire extinguishers to add to the safety equipment at the museum.
  - And finally, we need new outdoor and display signage including more durable, longer-lasting aluminum placards.



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
